ABC:

Anchor Peter Jennings reported that the Russian government is labelling the NATO bombing campaign in Bosnia "genocide." Correspondent David Ensor stated the Clinton Administration was "angrily denying the charges." [Clip of Clinton: "There has been no genocide there. There has been an extraordinary amount of care" on the part of NATO.] Ensor said that "the Administration is concerned about Moscow." He reported that an envoy was being sent "to placate the Russians" and noted, "while American diplomats fear that the Russians may try to spoil their peace efforts, their greatest concern is the Serbian General" [Clip of Sec. Christopher: "I hope that the Bosnian Serbs will come to their senses and realize that this is the time to take steps to bring this bombing to an end."]

CBS:

Anchor Dan Rather reported Russian politicians accused NATO of genocide against the Serbs. Correspondent David Martin reported Clinton Administration officials are "worried about how much longer the bombing can continue." He added they have "begun looking for a way to negotiate." Martin stated that "the political strain is starting to show. Some politicians are beginning to sound alarms." [Clip of Sen. John McCain: "It is clear that we are engaged in a military trap in Bosnia."] Martin concluded that "no one is calling the bombing campaign a failure, but one senior administration official is predicting that it will soon begin to taper off, in part because most of the easy targets are gone."

THE PRESIDENT:  
Thank you. Thank you, President  
Trumka, for that great  
introduction; and thank all of you  
for that wonderful welcome you just  
gave me. I got to know your

president, Rich Trumka, well in 1992, when we were campaigning together in Pennsylvania, and I learned that we have a lot in common. He's a kid from a small town, born just after the end of World War II. He still likes '50s rock and roll. He's the first person in his family to go to college and to law school. And when he first ran for president, nobody but his mother thought he had a chance.

But he kept  
plugging away in that modest,

-key way of his, and look where he is today. I'm also glad to be where he is today, and with him. I also want to acknowledge another friend from 1992, who helped show me around West Virginia -- your vice president Cecil Roberts, and your great secretary

Jerry Jones, of Illinois. I'm sorry I couldn't be with you in person, but I am there in spirit.

From your founding  
105 years ago, the members of the  
United Mine Workers have always  
been the shock

-proofs of American  
labor. And I'm proud we're  
fighting today for the same things.  
If your brave founders could be  
with you today, they'd find another  
time of great change and great  
challenge for American workers. At  
the end of the 19th century, when  
your union got started, America was  
first entering the Industrial Age.  
Now we're the world's leading  
industrial power, and we're moving  
full

-speed ahead into the global  
economy. Once again, we're  
challenged to make great decisions

-

-decisions that will shape the  
lives of our children and our  
children's children.

The Industrial Age brought us great opportunities, to be sure, but it also brought us child labor, the sweatshops, the company towns and the company stores, and the working men and women in our factories who grew old before their time, with injured bodies and broken spirits. That's why we built strong unions in our country, and we built a caring government to help Americans make the most of their own lives, and to protect them from abuses from which they could not protect themselves.

The unions built the middle class, and the middle class built America on the American Dream.

Now we find ourselves at another moment of great change. Even as we still depend upon the industrial might of coal miners and other workers, all of you know we're moving into an age characterized by information and technology and this new global economy that links more of us together economically, but also presents extraordinary new pressures on ordinary working people everywhere.

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Our challenge is to recognize and embrace new ideas to preserve our vision for the future -- a vision of high opportunity, where the middle class is growing and the under class is shrinking; people have the opportunities to live up to their own God

abilities; and families and communities have the ability to solve their own problems. We've got to hold on to that vision by holding on to the values which have always made this country great: freedom and responsibility; work and family; opportunity and the idea that we are, as my friend, Governor Chiles of Florida, said the other day, we are a community, not a crowd.

Now, a crowd is a collection of people who occupy the same space, just elbowing one another until the strongest and most powerful win, without regard of what happens to the others. A community is a group of people who occupy the same space, who believe

that they're going up or down together, and that they have responsibilities to one another. The United Mine Workers has helped to keep America a community, and I thank you for that.

You know, that's what this budget debate is really all about in Washington -- whether the America of the 21st century will be a community, as we want it to be, or a crowd, as so many in the Republican majority in Congress want it to be. We need to stop looking for ways to be divided, and start looking for ways to reach common ground and higher ground. We've got to be forward

□

-thinking enough to stand up for the future, even if it's not popular in the present. But we've got to be sensible enough to hold on to those core values which have made this country what it is.

The debate about the balanced budget is the biggest case in point. Let me be clear -- I strongly favor balancing the budget, to lift the burden of debt off our children, and to strengthen our economy. But I think we have to do it in a way that is consistent with those basic values. We've got to give people a chance to make the most of their own lives. We've got to strengthen our families; we've got to protect our children; we must honor our parents. We have to do things that will grow the middle class and shrink the under class, not increase the insecurity of working families.

These are the values we ought to be making decisions on about the budget. In my judgement, the congressional budget that the Republican majority has offered violates those values. We, the American people, need to be a part of this. We need to ask them basic questions. When we look at their budget, do we really want to support a budget that will deny 300,000 elderly people the right to be in the nursing homes they have today? Do we really want to eliminate all those quality standards for nursing homes? Can't anybody remember what it was like to go in those places when there were no quality standards? Do we really want to tax 17 million working families -- increasing taxes on them to the point that many of them will be put back into poverty, even though they're working; and take that money and give a tax break to upper

□

-income people who don't need it, and most of whom haven't asked for it?

Do we really want to say to a woman whose husband has to go to a nursing home that in order for your husband to qualify for any government assistance, you have to sell your car, your house, you have to spend all your life savings, you have to be totally impoverished? Do we really want to make it harder for poor young children to get off to a good start in school? Do we want to make it harder for our schools to have smaller classes and computers, even in the poor areas? Do we want to make it more costly for young people to get college loans?

Do we want to make fewer and fewer scholarships available so that more and more young people won't go to college and won't get good jobs with growing incomes? And do we want to let corporations loot their pension funds and compromise the retirement of their workers' future? How can we forget -- it was just a couple of years ago -- when we had all these pension funds going broke?

Just last December, I signed a bill that we passed through the last Congress to save the pensions of 8.5 million American workers, and TOP ODD - \p -

stabilize the pensions of 40 million more. Now, do we want to go along with the congressional budget plan to let corporations go and make that same mistake all over again, and to loot their pension funds legally?

Now, this budget does all those things. Those are the choices. If you want their budget in seven years, with their tax cut and their assumptions, and their plan, those are the choices in that budget. But there is another way. I have offered Congress a plan that balances the budget without destroying education, without undermining our commitment to the environment, and without violating our commitments to working families, the elderly and our children.

The budget debate forces us to answer a simple question -- do we want a government that upholds our values as a community and stands on the side of working people, struggling to build better lives for themselves? I think the answer is yes. And that is exactly what I have been working to do.

Two and a half years ago, you sent me to Washington to generate jobs, increase income, shrink the under class, grow the middle class, give America a better, stronger future. Since I started my job, our economy has created more than 7 million new jobs, 2.5 million new homeowners, 2 million new small businesses. Unemployment is down 20 percent. We're also cutting the deficit. You know, the deficit was \$290 billion when we started. It's down to \$160 billion now. That's a 40 percent cut; a cut for three years in a row -- the best performance since Harry Truman was President.

But you know better than anyone that we have a lot more to do to make sure America keeps working for and not against working families. That's why I fought for the passage of the Family and Medical Leave Act. That's why we gave a tax cut to 14 million working families with incomes under \$28,000. That's why I support an increase in the minimum wage. That's why I proposed a new G.I. Bill for America's workers -- to give people a check or a voucher when they're unemployed or underemployed, so they can take the money and take it to a local community college or any other training program for up to two years to get the kind of training they decide they need.

When people lose their jobs in this country today, too often the rest of our people walk away from them. And that's wrong. Our administration is pro

-union. Right  
after I took office, I got rid of my predecessor's antiworker, antiunion executive orders that weakened unions from public service to private industry.

With an executive order this spring, our administration said in no uncertain terms that we won't allow companies that do business with the government to permanently replace striking workers. (Applause.) We want to make sure that if you're forced to exercise your right to strike, you won't be fired for it. Make no mistake about it, we believe collective bargaining is a right and firing striking workers is wrong.

I often spoken about how America has to keep faith with the people who work hard and play by the rules. That means we must honor our obligations to those who risk our lives to go beneath the earth and mine our coal. Your workplace is unique. It can change in an instant from one of safety to one of danger. That's why we need to keep the Mine Safety and Health Administration and maintain it as a separate agency -- (applause.)

Under the outstanding leadership of Secretary Reich and Davitt McAteer, MSHA is enforcing the law, protecting workers and saving lives. You know better than anyone that in the 25 years since Congress passed the Mine Safety Act, the deaths in the coal mines have decreased by 77 percent. Now there are those in Congress who want to destroy MSHA, to limit inspections in unsafe mines and leave miners out in the cold who dare to blow the whistle and stand up for safety.

Well, there are no coal mines in Washington, D.C., and here, sometimes the voice of big money can shout down the voice of the people. That's why it is so important when United Mine Workers miners and Rich Trumпка come to the Capital, as they did, to tell why saving MSHA is literally a matter of life and death. And that's why I will fight and fight against any bill to cut or gut MSHA. (Applause.)

Keeping faith with people who have worked hard all their lives also means protecting coal miner retirees health care, as guaranteed in the Rockefeller Act, also known as the Coal Act. The Coal Act is our country's solemn covenant with more than 100,000 retired miners and their families to protect their health benefits and their peace of mind. It is not a matter of partisanship. This act was signed into law by President Bush and is supported to this day by the major coal companies.

Yesterday, you heard the author of that act, Senator Jay Rockefeller, explain how it is threatened and how it must be maintained. Today, let me tell you: We're going to fight to preserve your health benefits as guaranteed in the Coal Act. (Applause.)

Let me close by saying that I understand what's at stake as we fight to protect the health and safety of coal miners. When I was a young lawyer in Arkansas, just out of law school, back in the early 1970s, I handled several Black Lung cases for retired coal miners who could breath only with great difficulty after a lifetime in the mines.

Some of the folks from MSHA a letter that was found on the body of a coal miner who died in a mine explosion in Tennessee. Although a barricade held out the bad air for over seven hours, the trapped miners eventually succumbed to the suffocating gas. Here is what the miner, Jacob Vowell, wrote to his wife, Ellen:

Ellen, darling, goodbye for us both. We're all praying for air to support us, but it's getting bad without any air.

Ellen, I want you to live right and come to heaven. Raise the children as best you can. Oh, how I wish to be with you. It's 25 minutes after 2:00. There are a few of us alive yet. Oh, God, for one more breath. Ellen, remember me for as long as you live.

Goodbye, darling.

That letter was written 93 years ago. Today, thanks to the United Mine Workers, a better America and the grace of God, our miners are working in greater safety and living with greater dignity.

The future of our nation depends upon rewarding the efforts of people like you with safety, prosperity and dignity. You and your families and the millions and millions of working families like you -- you are heart and soul of the American Dream. We have to keep working together not just to preserve what's been won, but to continue to fight for better jobs, better wages and more justice.

The 21st century can be America's greatest time. Our children and our grandchildren can enjoy more freedom, more opportunity if we do what is right. But we can't let the people in Washington who are trying to do it, turn back the clock. We have to

keep America moving forward -- strong, proud and united -- in the words of your own banner. Let's stay that way and march into the 21st century victorious for the values of ordinary Americans.

STATEMENT BY THE PRESIDENT

THE PRESIDENT: Good afternoon. I have just finished meeting with my Cabinet to receive an update on the consequences of the government shutdown that Congress has imposed on the American people, and on the hardworking public employees who are now working without pay and the many who want to work, but are not permitted to return to work. Each day this shutdown continues the consequences grow worse.

Before I get into some of the specific things that came out of the Cabinet meeting, let me remind the American people that this shutdown is not caused by the fact that the congressional leaders and I have not yet reached agreement on a balanced budget plan or on all the appropriations for this year. In fact, it is part of an explicit strategy by Republicans to shut the government down to get their way on budget and tax issues.

This has never been done before. It is not a natural disaster. It is an unnatural disaster borne of a cynical political

strategy.

It is long past time to reopen the government. I am pleased that after two weeks of this shutdown, the Senate Republicans have voted to reopen the government, putting the interest of our country ahead of politics. Our budget talks are proceeding seriously and in good faith. I have been impressed by the efforts made on all sides, including those by Senator Dole and by Speaker Gingrich and Leader Armev and Senator Daschle and Mr. Gephardt. We are working together in good faith. This shutdown is not speeding our talks. It is only casting a shadow over them.

Let me report to you some of the specific examples of harm already caused by the shutdown. This week, the Meals On Wheels program for senior citizens will run out of money. Half the Head Start programs in the country will run out of money within the month. The Centers for Disease Control tracking system cannot accurately keep up with the flu outbreak in the midwest. On an average day, 260 small businesses are being denied \$40 million in capital -- loans that would create new jobs for Americans.

We are not able to enforce our trade laws to protect our workers and our products. We're not able to weatherize homes in this winter to protect the elderly from the cold.

Yesterday, the Environmental Protection Agency shut down toxic waste cleanups at 32 sites across America. Every day, 240 calls to the Drinking Water Contamination Hotline now go unanswered. The EPA's efforts to prevent cryptosporidium from contaminating city water supplies, something that proved a deadly threat in the city of Milwaukee, have been badly delayed. EPA enforcement efforts have completely stopped.

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Medicare contractors who serve our elderly are not being paid. Many of them now are dipping into their own pockets to keep health care coming, but they won't be able to do it for long. Ten states have run out of the funding they use to run our unemployment insurance program, and 15 more will so do so.

Ninety

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-five percent of all workplace safety activities have been shut down. All sweatshop enforcement has been stopped. And investigations into 3,500 potential cases of pension fraud have ground to a halt.

Two weeks ago when a mill burned down in Massachusetts, workers received immediate assistance for child care, transportation and job training. Last week when 2,000 workers lost their jobs from a Rhode Island factory, the Labor Department could not respond at all.

Medicaid funding that goes to pay for nursing home care,

pregnant women, the disabled, and poor children will be exhausted by the end of this month. Every day we are unable to process 2,500 applications for mortgage insurance. That means now a backlog of 20,000 who are losing their home loans -- many of them losing their chance to buy their new homes. Funds to pay for drugs, food and supplies at veterans hospitals run out today. And 170,000 veterans did not receive their December educational benefits.

At FEMA, an agency that has been universally praised by Republicans and Democrats alike, the emergency food and shelter program for people facing disasters has run out of funds. And according to Director James Lee Witt, some state emergency management agencies have actually had to shut their operations. We can only hope that they will not suffer a disaster while this occurs.

The Secretary of State reports that this shutdown is adversely affecting the national security of the country. We are running the risk of not being able to maintain our diplomacy abroad. And this shutdown, frankly, is injuring the reputation of the United States around the world. People wonder what is going on.

The shutdown has been especially devastating to hundreds of thousands of dedicated public servants who work for the American people through the federal government. Some of them have actually had their phones cut off, or can no longer pay for child care because they are working without pay or because they are not permitted to work. Some of those are so dedicated to their mission that they've actually tried to go to work and had to be run off.

It's time to stop holding the federal workers hostage in this process. As the Secretary of State says, this is not how a great country behaves. And as I have said for months and months and every day since this shutdown occurred, this is not how to balance the budget; it is not influencing our talks; we ought to reopen the government.

Again, let me say I'm convinced both sides want to balance the budget. We have different philosophies about how to do so. Based on the hours and hours we've spent working together, I'm convinced we can do it. But it is wrong, it is deeply wrong to shut the government down while we negotiate, under the illusion that somehow that will affect the decisions that I would make on specific issues. As I said, this is only casting a shadow over our talks. I will continue to do everything I can in good faith to reach an agreement. But it is wrong to shut the government down.

Again, let me compliment the Senate on abandoning that process and voting to open the government while we continue to work, and ask the House to follow suit.

THE PRESIDENT: Well, I have worked with our people, obviously, at OMB to explore every conceivable option to bring them back. And I will continue to do that. I have done everything that I have been told I can legally do, and we are exploring some other options. As other options come up, I will do whatever I can. I think this is very wrong.

But they also deserve to be paid. And the American people need to know that those who are not working are not out there idle of their own choice. They want to be here, they want to be working, and we ought to give them a chance to do it.

STATEMENT BY THE PRESIDENT ON THE MINIMUM WAGE

An increase in the minimum wage would honor our values: work, family, responsibility, and opportunity. You cannot raise a family on \$4.25 an hour. Over the years, both parties have worked together to ensure that the minimum wage keeps up with the cost of living. To continue that commitment to working families, I have challenged Congress to raise the minimum wage by 90 cents. It is clear that a bipartisan majority of the House of Representatives stands ready to pass this increase.

But the House leadership is today proposing a giant fraud on the American people. Their legislation will eliminate the minimum wage for all workers hired by fully two-thirds of American businesses.

I hope Senator Dole will join me in opposing this extreme measure. We must not tolerate sweatshops and a repeal of wage protections for millions of Americans, as a condition of assuring a living wage for some workers.

Let me be clear: Eliminating the minimum wage is no way to raise it. If Congress sends me a bill to eliminate the minimum wage and wage protections for millions of workers, I will veto it. Speaker Gingrich and Majority Leader Dole should allow an honest up-or-down vote on the minimum wage.

Judd said a judge ruled that Clinton's videotaped testimony will not be made public, which means they are not available for political opponents.

CDC Outlines Program To Combat Immunity Of Microbes To Medicine.  
(8th story in broadcast)

Jennings said the White House, after learning that the spread of infectious diseases spread, will announce \$200 million to fight infectious diseases. Correspondent George Strait said infectious diseases have caused 58 percent of the deaths since 1958, and are the third leading cause of death. Strait said only two labs in the country can handle the storage of new viruses. (VISUALS 1 & 2) Strait said American airports are gearing up for a flood of foreign visitors for the Olympics and have set up new facilities

to check for TB. Strait also said new drugs were being made to fight diseases.

The following is an update on NEC initiatives and policy development efforts:

School Construction: NEC staff completed work on the school construction initiative for the President's announcement on Thursday.

Church Burnings: NEC staff worked with the Vice President's Office toward a very successful meeting with the insurance industry on July 11. At the meeting, the industry assured the Vice President that no house of worship damaged by arson would go without insurance, and agreed to several other initiatives, including free on

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-site arson inspections and fire prevention education, an arson information reward hotline, and an insurance issues/problems hotline. Companies that had cancelled or non

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-renewed policies after an arson fire described what steps they had taken and were taking to prevent that from happening again.

Puerto Rico: NEC staff worked with members of the Interagency Working Group on Puerto Rico to develop an Administration position regarding the political status bill recently passed out to the House Resources Committee. The bill prescribes the process for the residents of Puerto Rico to vote on whether to remain a Commonwealth or to opt for independence or statehood. A major concern with the bill is that the process appears to be biased against retaining current commonwealth status (for instance, by requiring a new vote on status every four years if commonwealth is chosen). Moreover, the bill's ballot process could result in statehood being chosen even if this is not the most favored alternative for a plurality of Puerto Rican voters.

Pensions: The Small Business Tax Bill that passed the Senate includes a managers' amendment that -- with help from the NEC working group on pensions -- includes a significant part of the

President's pension program. A number of items of interest to the multiemployer plan community that had been left out of the House and Finance Committee bills were included -- a doubling of the guarantee level, reduction of the vesting period from 10 to 5 years, and protection of benefits for long

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-service moderate

-wage employees -- and the

Administration's portability and missing participants proposals were also included. While the minimum wage clearly led the day, this was a big victory for another Presidential initiative. We are starting to work with Ways and Means Democrats to ensure retention of what we achieved in the managers' amendment.

Natural Disasters: NEC attended the Natural Hazards Conference and spoke on insurance issues relating to natural disasters. The Senate Commerce Committee will hold a hearing on the latest version of the Natural Disaster Protection Act on July 18. A Treasury witness will testify. The NEC is coordinating the testimony.

DoD Privatization and Base Closures: NEC staff spent four days visiting military bases in California that are being closed (Mare Island Shipyard, Treasure Island, Alameda Naval Air Station, Oakland Army Hospital, Mather Air Force Base, Sacramento Army Depot and Long Beach Naval Shipyard) or privatized in place (McClellan Air Force Depot in Sacramento). Staff met with the mayors of Long Beach and Vallejo, and took part in a press event that got coverage throughout the Bay Area (NEC and DoD officials, together with Mayor of Vallejo and Warner Brothers officials, kicked off the filming of Michael Crichton's novel, "Sphere," at Mare Island).

The Administration's efforts to improve the base reuse process have led to a significant improvement, but there is still a long way to go: the military services still make it far too difficult for communities to redevelop these huge and potentially valuable pieces of property, through unnecessary delay, penny

-pinching and rigid interpretation of laws and regulations. Too often, conflicts have to be resolved at the political level.

The President will do an event at McClellan Air Force Depot on July 23 to announce a series of high

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-tech projects and progress on privatization; NEC staff is working with DoD on getting the pieces (funding, property conveyances, etc.) for that event in place. There is considerable follow

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-up on other California base issues as well, particularly in Long Beach, Los Angeles and San Diego. NEC staff met w/ Rep. Filner regarding a controversial closure issue in San Diego.

Aerospace Negotiations with Russia/Gore

-Chernomyrdin: NEC staff worked with USTR and Commerce to prepare for consultations with the Russians on market access for U.S. aircraft. Gore and Chernomyrdin signed a market access agreement in January, but the Russians have been slow to implement it; this week's consultations yielded the first concrete results. Gore will site this in his talks with Chernomyrdin and perhaps push for additional concessions.

Fund for Rural America: NEC staff will convene a group to come up with an approach/ideas for implementing the Fund for Rural America -- a \$300 million appropriation that was part of the Farm Bill. The NEC developed the Administration's Farm Bill guidance on rural economic development, and this is an opportunity to put that guidance into practice. In addition, the lessons from key

Administration technology programs (ATP and TRP) and economic development initiatives (EZs/ECs) are relevant: e.g., competition and cost

-sharing is essential; and small amounts of federal money can have a substantial catalytic effect.

SUBJECT: NEC STAFF WEEKLY REPORT

The following is an update on NEC initiatives and policy development efforts:

**Pensions:** The NEC working group continued to work on a variety of pension issues, including the Boxer amendment concerning limitations on employer real estate in 401(k) plans (substantive discussions with Labor, Treasury, PBGC, meeting on Hill with Daschle staff), and responses to the TSP provisions in the Mica Civil Service Reform bill (urging OMB that the Administration should oppose lifting the TSP cap, particularly the 5% cap on CSRS employees), and the Form 5500 (serious money problems at IRS and DOL). NEC staff also participated with DOL staff in an OIRA meeting on the regulation concerning timing of employer transfer of employee 401(k) funds.

**Natural Disasters:** NEC staff helped coordinate and write testimony for Deputy Treasury Summers before the Senate Commerce Committee on the Natural Disaster Protection Act. The bill before the Committee, while it includes a provision strongly resembling one in our February 1995 policy paper, is a narrow insurance

□

-based bill with a number of other problems, which the Administration had told Senator Stevens, the sponsor, we could not support. Unfortunately, however, the Senator decided to take out his frustration on the witness. We will hold an NEC Deputies meeting next week to determine next steps. However, we are getting indications from interested parties that we are far from alone in our position and Stevens may be asked by others (to whom he will listen) not to proceed to markup.

**Alameda Corridor:** NEC staff helped develop interagency strategy for a meeting hosted by John Emerson with representatives of Los Angeles concerning funding for economic development planning on the Alameda Corridor, and attended the meeting.

**Technology Issues:** NEC and OSTP staff are working on a possible

announcement associated with the Medal of Science/Medal of Technology event on Friday. In response to a directive from the President, DoE will announce that it is purchasing the largest supercomputer in the world. This computer will be used for nuclear weapons stockpile stewardship, but can also be used for civilian applications as well.

□

**U.S. Enrichment Corporation (USEC) Privatization:** An NEC

□

-led deputies meeting produced agreement to submit to the President in the near future a decision memo regarding whether to proceed with privatization. The memo will be accompanied by a summary of the process that would be followed in developing privatization options, as well as a description of the Administration's ongoing role in obtaining favorable sale terms.

**Nuclear Waste Management Legislation:** The NEC is working closely with CEQ, other White House offices, and DOE in developing information and strategies for use in opposition to pending Senate nuclear waste legislation. The bill, which the President has promised to veto, would suspend environmental requirements and direct DOE to construct an interim spent fuel storage

facility in Nevada. Contrary to the Administration's position, construction would begin before DOE has collected sufficient scientific data to determine the viability of a proposed permanent repository site in that State. A cloture vote on the bill is expected on July 25th.
