

The Belarusian Supreme Soviet yesterday ratified the START I Treaty, Lisbon Protocol, and Non-Proliferation Treaty (NPT) without reservations or conditions. The almost unanimous vote is a milestone in our efforts to achieve the denuclearization of the non-Russian republics of the former Soviet Union, since the agreements bind Belarus to a program and schedule for removing nuclear missiles from its territory. NPT ratification, moreover, strongly reaffirms Belarus' resolve to become a non-nuclear weapons state.

The Belarusians have long complained that the Ukrainians, by delaying START and NPT ratification, receive attention (and money) for not fulfilling their commitments to the international community. A prompt congratulatory call -- Saturday or Monday -- from the President to Chairman of the Supreme Soviet Shushkevich would destroy this notion and highlight our appreciation of the historic vote of the Supreme Soviet. With this vote, Belarus is breaking the stagnation of the last months of the Bush Administration and enabling our denuclearization policy to get off to a fast start.

We recommend avoiding a detailed discussion of policy issues in this call. (See suggested talking points at Tab A.) You should be aware, however, that Foreign Minister Kravchanka expressed the hope, in a conversation with our Ambassador (Tab B), that the United States apply Nunn-Lugar funds (no less than \$150 million) to assist Belarus in five priority areas related to the denuclearization process. These proposals will be addressed in a separate memorandum. Kravchanka will likely be in Washington for the opening of the Belarusian embassy in late March. We should target that occasion as an opportunity to discuss what can be done in response to these proposals.

MEMORANDUM OF TELEPHONE CONVERSATION

SUBJECT: Telecon with Supreme Soviet Chairman
Stanislav Shushkevich of Belarus

AND PLACE: Oval Office

The President: Hello, Mr. Chairman, I am truly delighted to have the opportunity to speak with you and congratulate you on the historic step taken by your Supreme Soviet on Thursday. (U)

By taking the lead in ratifying START I and the Non-Proliferation Treaty, Belarus has proven itself a real leader among the countries of the world. Your resolve to become a non-nuclear state, shown by this vote, is unprecedented in the history of mankind. I hope that your action will be a strong example to all of the parties to START I and the Lisbon Protocols. (S)

In response to your vote, the U.S. is prepared immediately to extend security assurances to your country. They will reiterate our commitments to non-aggression, territorial integrity, and non-use of nuclear weapons. I have instructed Ambassador Shwartz to transmit the text of the assurances to you, and to discuss them with you. (S)

I also wanted to assure you that we are committed to providing substantial resources through the Nunn-Lugar Act here in the United States to assist in the denuclearization process in Belarus. (S)

As a first step toward building our cooperation in this area, I suggest that our Secretary of State Christopher and Foreign Minister Kravchanka meet during the Minister's visit here to Washington to open your embassy in March. At that time we expect to discuss some concrete proposals with you, in response to the five priority denuclearization needs that your government has suggested. (S)

And beyond these priorities, I wanted to assure you that I look forward to working with you to develop a relationship that focuses not simply on security issues, but also on closer economic, political, and cultural ties as well. (U)

I thank you once again, Chairman Shushkevich, and I congratulate you on your truly historic step. (U)

Chairman Shushkevich: Thank you very much, Mr. President. First of all, I want to congratulate you on taking office and I want to wish you success on behalf of Belarus and all of mankind. (U)

The President: Thank you. (U)

Chairman Shushkevich: The ratification of START I and other treaties is a larger continuation of the policy of Belarus toward neutrality and denuclearization. I thank you very much, Mr. President, for offering us security assurances and the other steps you suggested. I promise to consider all problems and take the necessary actions. (S)

Already certain elements of the Nunn-Lugar funds have been agreed to, and I hope we will find additional opportunities beyond the funds mentioned when the senators were here in Minsk. I firmly believe that Belarus will be a good obstacle to the transit of nuclear arms from Russia through Lithuania, Latvia, and Poland to the West. I believe we can be a good obstacle to the transfer of arms. (S)

It is good that Foreign Minister Kravchanka and Secretary of State Christopher will meet in March when our embassy opens. We hope relations will develop in two directions: in the conversion of nuclear weapons; and in helping Belarus economically to become independent. I also hope to work closely with Belarussian emigrants in the United States now that we are on the road to democracy. (S)

Thank you very much for your cultural and economic help and for your warm attitude. Thank you, Mr. President. (U)

The President: I look forward to working with you and becoming very close over the years. (U)

Chairman Shushkevich: Thank you and good-bye. (U)



I. KEY POINTS

- Congratulate Shushkevich on Belarus' ratification of START I and its accession to the NPT as a non-nuclear weapons state;
- Encourage Shushkevich's emphasis on political and economic reform as the foundation for Belarus' future;
- Seek agreement to expand our economic ties and opportunities for U.S. trade and investment.

II. BACKGROUND

This will be your first official meeting in Washington with a leader of one of the new, independent states of the former Soviet Union. You extended that special distinction to Chairman of the Belarusian Supreme Soviet, Stanislav Shushkevich, to thank him for his efforts to promote a democratic and non-nuclear future for his country.

You have two principal aims in this meeting.

- First, you should congratulate him on Belarus' ratification of START I and accession to the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty. He will present the NPT papers of accession to you in the meeting. You will want to discuss our provision of \$59 million in Nunn-Lugar assistance to Belarus to help with their dismantling and destruction of nuclear weapons. It would also be helpful if you could thank him publicly for this action during the press opportunity.
- Second, you will also want to encourage his efforts to build a democratic and market-oriented state in Belarus. During his stay here, Shushkevich will also see Secretaries Aspin, Brown and Espy and visit the IMF and World Bank.

Shushkevich, a physicist by training, is a political amateur compared to Yeltsin, Kravchuk, Nazarbayev and most of the other leaders of the new states. Not a prominent player in Belarus or the USSR during the Soviet period, he emerged at the time of independence in late 1991 as an individual intent on building a more liberal and tolerant political system. As Head of State and Chairman of the country's parliament, the Supreme Soviet, he has waged a difficult battle against the government of Prime Minister Kebich which is much less enthusiastic about either political or economic reform and prefers to rebuild old command economic ties with Ukraine and Russia. Shushkevich now finds himself isolated and without strong party support in Parliament; he has barely survived two votes of confidence in recent months. His political future is uncertain given the determination of his opponents to stem the liberal policies he has tried to introduce. His relations with most senior members of the government are so bad, in fact, that the center-right Foreign Minister refused to accompany him on this trip.

Despite these problems, Shushkevich's efforts on the nuclear issue still warrant our public and private support. You will find him to be an earnest and sympathetic person who desires a closer relationship with the U.S. His only other meeting with an American leader was a brief encounter with President Bush at the Helsinki CSCE Summit in 1991. The fact that you invited him here has already strengthened his position at home. The invitation and the other honors to be given to him in Washington (Blair House, an official military welcome at the Pentagon) will demonstrate our support for his policies. In addition, we have negotiated a Joint Declaration outlining our common interest in reform and a closer bilateral relationship. We will make this document (Tab E) public at the time of your meeting.

We suggest you begin your meeting with him by reaffirming our support for his decision to commit Belarus to a non-nuclear future. In noting our commitment of considerable Nunn-Lugar assistance to Belarus, you can stress that his government's cooperative and businesslike approach is making it possible for us to undertake innovative projects in Belarus involving environmental cleanup, defense conversion and housing for military officers. You should also seek his views on Belarus' future security orientation.

On the economic side, we need to push for much closer and deeper cooperation between our governments and greater access for American firms. Given Belarus' failure to undertake significant and fundamental economic reforms, our ability to provide support has been limited to humanitarian and technical assistance. Our economic relationship is consequently much less developed than with Russia, Ukraine and Kazakhstan. You should push specifically for faster movement on our negotiations to complete the Bilateral Investment and Tax treaties and a Peace Corps agreement.

Shushkevich may ask you for a wide range of specific economic assistance help. We have provided points for you should these issues arise.

One interesting note on Shushkevich's background: He told one of our Embassy officers that, as a Minsk factory worker in 1961, he was assigned to teach Russian to Lee Harvey Oswald during the latter's temporary stay in the USSR.

POINTS TO BE MADE FOR MEETING
WITH CHAIRMAN SHUSHKEVICH OF BELARUS

OVERVIEW POINTS

- I am delighted to welcome you to the White House as the first leader of one of the new, independent states to make an official visit to Washington during my Administration.
- I regret the scheduling change necessitated by my trip to Little Rock tomorrow.
- We have tried hard to make this a special visit for you in order to demonstrate our strong support for Belarus' non-nuclear future, and for your own efforts to promote political and economic reform.

(If Shushkevich asks you to visit Belarus after your trip to Russia in late autumn:

- I would like to visit Minsk in principle but must first work out my fall travel schedule.)

NUCLEAR/SECURITY ISSUES

- I understand you have with you the instruments of accession to the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty (NPT).
- You have made a historic decision to join one of the most important treaty regimes of our time -- congratulations.
- I applaud how quickly you have honored your international commitments. Under your leadership, Belarus has taken courageous steps to safeguard the world from threats of nuclear destruction.
- In turn, I wanted to let you know that from this point on, we consider ourselves committed to the security assurances that we earlier shared with you. As you know, they include:
 - Respecting your independence, sovereignty and existing borders and recognizing that borders can only be changed by peaceful means;
 - Reaffirming our commitment to seek immediate UN Security Council action should Belarus become a victim of aggression involving nuclear weapons;
 - Reaffirming our commitment not to use nuclear weapons against Belarus or any non-nuclear weapon state party to the Non-Proliferation Treaty.

- We envision a more formal presentation of these assurances together with Russia and the United Kingdom.
- I am delighted that this week our countries have signed three agreements providing for \$59 million to assist in the dismantlement and clean-up of nuclear weapons in Belarus.
- Each of these agreements breaks new ground in our cooperation with states of the former Soviet Union to assist dismantlement of the Soviet nuclear arsenal and conversion of its infrastructure to beneficial uses.
- I am especially pleased that we will provide some assistance for housing for your military officers, which I know is of particular importance to you.
- We want our close cooperation to continue, and will work closely with your experts to determine how best to spend the remaining \$6 million in FY93 funds that are committed to you.
- Assuming our proposal for FY94 Nunn-Lugar funding is approved by Congress, we will work with you to determine additional programs of cooperation for the future.
- Finally, I am very pleased we have worked out an agreement to promote closer military-to-military ties.

(If Shushkevich requests help in meeting costs of complying with the CFE treaty:

- We take seriously Belarusian concerns over the costs of implementing reductions mandated by the Treaty on Conventional Forces in Europe (CFE). We stand willing to continue discussing the achievement of reductions at the lowest possible cost.)

Political Reform in Belarus

- We strongly support your efforts to put into place a new, democratic constitution, and to hold free and fair national elections. I understand that you have faced some real battles with your Parliament.
- Belarus has a well-deserved reputation of stability, but I would urge you to continue putting into place both political and economic reforms as soon as possible.
- We would like to expand our programs to support democratization in Belarus, including exchanges.
- The Joint Declaration we will issue today affirms our common interest in a democratic and peaceful future.

- I would be interested in your comments on the future political orientation of Belarus and the struggle to maintain momentum in the reform effort.

U.S.-Belarus Economic Relations

- I want to expand our economic cooperation, particularly in stimulating private trade and investment.
- I commend your government for recently reaching an agreement with the IMF on a Systemic Transformation Facility which lays a strong foundation for economic stabilization. I urge you to continue working with the IMF on a comprehensive economic reform program.
- On the bilateral side, we need to push our governments to reach agreement soon on other important items: the Bilateral Investment Treaty, the Tax Treaty and the Peace Corps Agreement. All three would strengthen ties between our countries.
- We will be following the progress of other important reform proposals as they move through your legislature, particularly the draft privatization program.
- As you continue in your efforts to reform the economy of Belarus, we will continue to provide humanitarian assistance and cooperation in agriculture, food, and medicines.
 - We will send a special flight soon with medicines and medical supplies to treat cancer patients - I know this is important because Belarus is still suffering from the effects of Chernobyl.
- I know you have expressed specific interest in an enterprise fund, help in energy efficiency, in creating a currency and in advisors to promote private agriculture.
 - I have asked Strobe Talbott to see what we can do to provide technical assistance in all of these areas.
 - We are particularly interested in assisting your privatization effort and will send a team of experts to help you plan.
- Concerning food assistance, as Secretary Espy undoubtedly told you, we hope to provide additional grant assistance during fiscal year 1994.
 - USDA is anxious to work with you on an experimental basis to try to use the Chernobyl-contaminated land to grow canola and convert it to diesel fuel.

U.S. Assistance to Belarus

Humanitarian Assistance:

The U.S. has provided approximately \$65 million in humanitarian assistance to the Republic of Belarus to improve the living standards of its people by delivering emergency food and medical supplies.

Medical Deliveries:

-- Under Operation Provide Hope we have delivered 75 tons of medicines and medical supplies worth over \$8 million in 1992.

-- Private Sector Contributions of 609 tons of food, medical supplies and clothing valued at \$6.2 million have been delivered.

-- The Medical Assistance Initiative, known as Project Hope, shipped \$8.2 million in medical supplies and pharmaceuticals to Minsk in May. Another flight of medicines and medical supplies to treat cancer and leukemia patients will be delivered in October. The estimated value of this shipment is \$1.5 million.

Food Assistance:

The U.S. Department of Agriculture provided over \$48 million in food assistance during FY 1992, including \$24 million in concessional loans to purchase U.S. agricultural products, 3,340 metric tons of commodities valued at \$3.8 million under the Food for Progress program, and \$10.8 million worth of Section 416(b) commodities.

This fiscal year, under the Food for Progress program USDA will provide 50,000 metric tons of feed wheat, 200,000 metric tons of corn, and an additional \$23.8 million in various commodities. In March, Belarus signed an agreement worth \$5 million in commodities under the PL 480, Title I program. USDA has also worked with several private volunteer organizations to provide soybean meal to orphanages in Minsk and to distribute 3,340 metric tons of USDA commodities to the needy.

Technical Assistance:

-- Private Sector Development: Five managers and scientists from Belarus have been selected to participate in the Special American Business Internship Training (SABIT) program run by the Commerce Department. The Treasury Department has also sent two long-term resident financial advisers to Minsk.

-- Health Care: A hospital-to-hospital partnership was established in March between Pittsburgh Children's Hospital and a hospital in Minsk to focus on pediatric radiology and oncology.

-- Agriculture: Nine Belarusians received training in agribusiness under a USDA fellowship program. Approximately 20 U.S. volunteers will participate in the Farmer-to-Farmer Program, assisting Belarusian private agriculture.

-- Rule of Law and Political Assistance: Eight members of the Belarus Parliament participated in a program on the U.S. legislative process in April, learning about small business development and other activities at the federal, state, and local levels.

-- Chairman Shushkevich's Chief of Staff took part in a three-week training program which included meetings with executive and legislative branch officials in Washington, D.C. and municipal offices in four states.

-- Two advisers from the Institute of Public Administration helped draft the Belarusian constitution in Minsk.

Credit Guarantees and Economic Agreements:

-- Belarus is eligible for EXIM short-term financing insurance for U.S. investments. An OPIC agreement was signed in June, 1992 and is currently in force. A bilateral trade agreement granting MFN status entered into force in February 1993.

BELARUS: Safe and Secure Dismantlement Assistance

Our program of assistance for the safe and secure dismantlement (SSD) of nuclear weapons in the former Soviet Union, authorized by the Nunn-Lugar legislation, is further along with Belarus than with any of the other three states (Kazakhstan, Russia and Ukraine) with nuclear weapons on their territory. This has resulted from Belarus' early ratification of START and accession to the Nuclear Nonproliferation Treaty, as well as its close cooperation with our SSD Delegation and technical experts.

We have previously signed with Belarus an SSD umbrella agreement establishing the legal framework for our assistance, and three implementing agreements providing \$9.56 million for emergency response equipment, a continuous communications link between our governments to pass arms control notifications, and improvements in the Belarusian system of export controls. In response to Belarus' quick action on START and NPT, we promised them an additional \$65 million in FY93 assistance. The SSD Delegation recently completed three agreements for \$59 million of this amount, to be signed during Chairman Shushkevich's visit. They are:

- An amendment to the export control agreement, raising the level of assistance from \$2.26 million to \$16.26 million.
- An environmental restoration agreement, providing \$25 million for cleanup of former Strategic Rocket Forces (SRF) facilities and sites.
- A defense conversion agreement, providing \$20 million for the conversion of military technologies and capabilities into civilian activities.

A key element of this new package of assistance is a pilot project providing comprehensive aid to a single former SRF base, probably the SS-25 missile site at Lida. Under this project, funds will be drawn from both the environmental restoration and defense conversion agreements to clean up the base, convert nearby facilities to civilian production, and provide housing for former SRF officers. Shushkevich, like other NIS leaders, has placed particular importance on assistance for housing. We plan to make this project into a showcase for what our assistance can achieve.

We are continuing to work with Belarus to target the remaining \$6 million in promised FY93 assistance. The Belarusians want to use the funds for disposition of propellants from a variety of missiles or for elimination of conventional ammunition. We are leaning toward the former as an area of greater need that is also a higher priority of the Nunn-Lugar legislation.

Joint Declaration on U.S.-Belarus Relations

At their meeting at the White House, President of the United States Bill Clinton and Chairman of the Supreme Soviet Stanislav Shushkevich agreed on the need to accelerate the building of close and mutually beneficial relations on all levels between the United States of America and the Republic of Belarus. Chairman Shushkevich was the first leader of any of the new independent states of the former Soviet Union to visit Washington for an official meeting with President Clinton. The meeting demonstrated the importance that the United States and the Republic of Belarus attach to broadening and deepening their relationship.

By virtue of its early ratification of the START I Treaty and accession to the Non-Proliferation Treaty as a non-nuclear state, the Republic of Belarus has demonstrated to the world its determination to chart a responsible and stable course. This is a significant contribution to strengthening global security and maintaining peace. The deposit of its instrument of accession to the Non-Proliferation Treaty by the Republic of Belarus during Chairman Shushkevich's visit to the United States demonstrated its firm intent to build a peaceful future. In support of these far-sighted steps, the United States and Belarus signed agreements during Chairman Shushkevich's visit under which the United States will provide \$59 million in Nunn-Lugar assistance to the Republic of Belarus. The agreements cover assistance relating to export control, conversion and environmental restoration of military bases, especially strategic rocket forces bases, and conversion of defense facilities to civilian use.

The United States and the Republic of Belarus stressed their determination to work actively to prevent the proliferation of weapons of mass destruction and associated technologies. The United States applauded the removal last year of all tactical nuclear weapons from the territory of the Republic of Belarus. The Republic of Belarus reaffirmed its commitment to complete the removal of all remaining nuclear weapons under the provisions of the START I Treaty and the Lisbon Protocol. The United States expressed its strong support for the announced intention of the Republic of Belarus to achieve a permanent non-nuclear status as well as for its intention to pursue a foreign policy of neutrality.

The United States recognizes that the Republic of Belarus faces new challenges in ensuring its national security and is ready to work closely with Belarus to assist it in finding ways to meet these challenges. The United States and the Republic of Belarus further expressed their desire to facilitate contact between appropriate government officials with a view to broadening defense cooperation and expanding their dialogue on security issues of mutual interest.

The United States and the Republic of Belarus pledged to cooperate in building a durable democratic peace across Europe. International security can no longer be achieved through the efforts of individual states by acquiring ever increasing amounts of weaponry. Rather, security must be based on reduced levels of armaments among all nations, and on a multilateral commitment to uphold shared values, especially democracy, the inviolability of borders, territorial integrity, and peaceful resolution of disputes. The United States and the Republic of Belarus agreed that working together in multilateral institutions like CSCE and the North Atlantic Cooperation Council is an important means of promoting these goals and values.

The Republic of Belarus and the United States reaffirm their commitment to comply fully with the obligations of the Treaty on Conventional Forces in Europe. The United States stands ready to provide technical assistance, advice, and expertise to assist the Republic of Belarus as it continues to meet these obligations. President Clinton and Chairman Shushkevich agreed that the two governments should continue to work together -- and with other concerned governments -- to explore ways to minimize the cost of meeting these commitments.

President Clinton and Chairman Shushkevich agreed that the independence of the Republic of Belarus and its commitment to democracy and market economic reform could make an important contribution to stability in a region of Europe that has known great tragedy and upheaval. The United States and the Republic of Belarus underscored their intention to cooperate actively to achieve this goal. The President and the Chairman agreed to protect and promote the values that bind together the democratic community of nations, including free and fair elections, freedom of emigration, the rule of law, respect for human rights, including free speech, free press, and respect for the rights of individuals belonging to minorities. The United States strongly supported the commitment of the Republic of Belarus to develop in full accordance with these principles and its efforts to build a just and stable society where the fundamental freedoms of all peoples are guaranteed.

The United States and the Republic of Belarus expressed their determination to advance the values of economic freedom, without which democracy cannot succeed and prosperity cannot be attained. The Republic of Belarus reaffirmed its determination to build a market economy through appropriate macroeconomic stabilization policies and structural reforms to promote market development, economic recovery and growth, and to create conditions which will permit foreign investment to assist in the modernization and restructuring of its economy. The Republic of Belarus will also seek to create conditions supportive of foreign investment, which will be an important component in the restructuring of the economy. The United States will assist the Republic of Belarus to promote economic stabilization, privatization, restructuring, free trade and foreign investment. Both sides recognize the importance of improved market access to their firms, and the need to ensure economic progress and deepen economic cooperation.

President Clinton and Chairman Shushkevich agreed to work together to remove all unnecessary barriers to bilateral trade and investment and to finalize preparations for signing the treaty for mutual protection of investments. They also agreed on the advisability of concluding an agreement on avoidance of double taxation and prevention of evasion of income and property taxation.

The United States reaffirmed its intention to continue providing assistance to the Republic of Belarus in the areas of agriculture, food, medicine, fiscal and monetary policy, and other areas to promote economic and political reform in Belarus. The United States expressed its intention to assist the Government of the Republic of Belarus in combatting the devastating effects of the Chernobyl nuclear accident.

The United States and the Republic of Belarus are also ready to expand their relations in such areas as science, culture, arts, education, law, tourism, and student exchanges.

By agreeing to work cooperatively to advance common political, economic, and security interests, the United States and the Republic of Belarus have laid the foundation for a strong, diversified, and friendly relationship.
